Fifty years in a neighborhood is a pretty substantial amount of time. For Ms. Wanda Ward, also known as "Grandma," it's been her home, her community, and the hub of her family for decades. Though Grandma has oodles of grandkids, she's known throughout the neighborhood by that moniker.

"I helped rear almost all the children in our neighborhood. They would come to my house and play while their families were at work, explained Ms. Ward. "Everybody just started calling me Grandma."

Grandma has worked hard to preserve her home for her future generations. When she and her late husband purchased this home on the Westside of Indianapolis, the intent was to do so for the blessing of their children's children.

"I feel when you move into a house that it's your home," said Grandma. "You're supposed to protect it and it protects you."

However, after the passing of her husband and the constant "can we put this in your garage?" from friends and family, things began to get away from Grandma. This past year she was cited by the Marion County Public Health Department for several exterior issues with her home and yard.



"It makes my heart just melt because, you know, in this day and age you feel like there's just not that many people out there that care."




MOST SERVED ZIP CODES

could even potentially lose their

homeowner and frequently refer cited
homeowners to us for help.

BYPLUS

We were awarded funds from CICF on behalf of Lilly Endowment Inc. through its initiative, Enhancing Opportunity in Indianapolis. The grant supports a construction trade training program called BY Plus: Good People, Good Jobs, Good Careers. The program is led by the foundation in collaboration with Indiana Construction Roundtable Foundation, Indianapolis Legal Aid and Neighborlink Indianapolis.

We successfully completed two work experience cohorts of BY Plus trainees in 2021. In first two cohorts we were able to meet the students at their level of competency and comfort. We worked through basics like how to safely use a miter saw, and using different types of screws based on the job. Using real projects for homeowners allowed us to walk through problem solving scenarios to help prepare the students for on-the job situations.

For our first cohort, we tackled yard grading, concrete repair, wood fence construction, siding repair, and painting. During our second cohort we safely removed a wood deck, graded around the existing deck, and used a post hole digger to set our posts for the new deck. In addition to the deck, we installed a new section of gutters and repaired vinyl siding that was damaged in a small fire.

We helped three different homeowners and completed 16 projects. Of those 16 projects, 12 were citations. Thankfully we were able to help and get them in a good position to clear those citations






COMMUNITY SUPPORT

We were blown away by the community support this year. Not only were we awarded grant funding to help support our growth and infrastructure establishment, we were awarded grant funding to support our need for hired subcontractors to take on the backlog of COVID related projects. In addition to these grants, we were awarded the grant funds to support hiring two full time project coordinators specific to the BYPlus program. This enabled us to accomplish even more home repair projects.

VOLUNTEERS

In addition to community support through funding, we had a whopping 35 volunteer groups come out and serve our seniors with a fair amount of elbow grease. These pre-organized groups joined us from community organizations, companies, churches and even groups of friends all gathered and met the needs of our communities with such enthusiasm it was a huge boost to our homeowners in more ways than one.



OUR TEAM

Founder Dave Withey retired in September from the Executive Director role and appointed Rachel Nelson as the organization's first paid Executive Director. Dave remains as advisor and helping with development needs as well as directing a gutter repair team. It has been noted on multiple occasions Dave is not great at "retiring."

This year our leadership team grew to be comprise of eight paid staff and a number of dedicated handy volunteers.
